

After months of lockdown and quarantine, the Cook Islands Government repatriation of stranded Cook Islanders can be deemed a resounding success.

Three groups of Cook Islanders, residents, and permit holders have now been repatriated since the government began the repatriation process in April 2020.

While it has been difficult on those who completed supervised quarantine both here and in NZ, the entire process is being widely applauded given the Cook Islands was one of the first in the Pacific to repatriate 260 residents' home safely.

Following Cabinet's decision to repatriate Cook Islands residents caught up in the border closures in March, there has been much effort to coordinate their safe return. This was especially sensitive with arrangements beginning while NZ was still in lockdown – alert level 4.

"We have many people to thank" says Dr Herman Secretary of Health, "and we hope we have not overlooked them in the list below".

"What this project highlighted, was the strength of our professional relationships and collegial links to our diaspora who have been instrumental in helping us organise this repatriation process.

"We acknowledge Dr Ashley Bloomfield, Director General NZ Ministry of Health, Dr Dale Bramley, CEO Waitemata District Health Board, and Dr Joe Wiliams, Clinical Director Mt Wellington Integrated Health Care. Their three organisations signed an Arrangement of Cooperation with Te Marae Ora in July 2019.

"May we also commend Dr Kiki Maoate and Mrs Debbie Sorenson the respective President and CEO of Pasifika Medical Association (PMA) for their leadership and organising the PMA team to oversee the repatriation process in Auckland. Dr Joe Williams is Patron of PMA and played an important role in providing clinical support for the daily health checks with the support of Whanau Ora team leaders John Kiria.

Dr Ted Hughes a longstanding member of PMA and one of several senior clinical advisors to Te Marae Ora also assisted in facilitating this process. While Mrs Rosie Blake Cook Islands Auckland Consular General and her team comprising Tarita and Francis provided social welfare checks.

Four weeks of supervised quarantine has been a challenge for many, yet one Cook Islands family found the final two weeks in Rarotonga rather enjoyable.

Marisa Newman, Air NZ's Cook Islands Manager, travelled to New Zealand with her family of five to check up on her elderly parents. After borders were shut, they ended up being away from their Rarotonga home for seven weeks.

The family began the final phase of the repatriation process last month, with two weeks of supervised quarantine at the Edgewater Resort and Spa.

"The service from the (Edgewater) team has been amazing," said Ms. Newman. "Congratulations to you and your fantastic team."
